The dilemma of "war and man" is one of the leading themes of Azerbaijani prose of the period of independence, which attracts attention with its colorfulness and dynamism.

The theme of war in literature has always been in the center of attention and has become the main line of various artistic works. The pearls of world literature on this topic are also considered in Azerbaijani literature

"War and Peace" by L. Tolstoy and "The Call of Emergency" by E. Hemingway have been created. "War" by Abulhasan, "Dolu" by Agil Abbas, "Tek" by Orkhan Fikretoglu

In Elchi's novels, "Bayragdar", Aslan Guliyev's "Former Warrior and Boy" and other works of this kind, the theme of war and people are skillfully elaborated. Speaking of the prose works related to Karabakh and the loss of Karabakh in the period of independence in Azerbaijani literature, attention is paid to the artistic solution of this topic in the example of Elchi's "Bayragdar" (2004), Aslan Guliyev's "Ex-Warrior and Boy" (2003) and Orkhan Fikretoglu's novels "Tek" (2014). should be done.
